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

## GGC Mathematics in Action Scholars Program

Georgia Gwinnett College will host its 2nd Annual Mathematics in Action Scholars Program this summer, beginning June 2<sup>nd</sup> and June 9<sup>th</sup>. The program plans to accept 48 (24 students each week) academically talented or highly motivated middle-school students in Gwinnett and surrounding counties. The scholars will study the mathematics of finance and use geometry to solve real world problems. The students will also engage in mathematics activities, such as building mouse-trap race cars. This program was funded in part by the Mathematical Association of America's Dolciani Mathematics Enrichment Grant Program (<http://www.maa.org/programs/maa-grants/dolciani-mathematics-enrichment-grants>).

AMATYC offers webinars throughout the year at no cost and members get the first opportunity to register. We also have high quality publications – AMATYC *News* and the *MathAMATYC Educator*. The organization puts forth position statements on issues facing mathematics education today that can be used in efforts to influence decisions being made more locally. There are nine academic committees that focus on aspects of our profession that are near and dear to our hearts. Anyone can join any of these committees and participate in discussions. Marilyn Monroe once said “This life is what you make of it.” I would paraphrase this to say that “AMATYC is what you make of it.” The more involved the membership, the stronger

and more effective AMATYC will be. I would like to give you a “heads up”. The cost of membership is going up as of July 1, 2014. Up until that time a 1 year membership in AMATYC is \$80. After that time the dues will increase to \$85. I know most people renew their membership when they register for the conference. I would suggest you not wait until then and instead renew before the increase.

## Student Math Leagues

One of the benefits of being an AMATYC affiliate school is the opportunity to give your students the chance to participate in the AMATYC Student Math League. This national competition is designed for two-year college students. While none of the problems require calculus, the problems range from quite do-able to rather challenging. These tests provide students with an opportunity to encounter problems unlike those they see in class, stretching their repertoire of problem-solving techniques and combining concepts they may not have combined before. It also gives them a chance to measure themselves against other students from similar institutions on a regional and national stage without having to leave their home institutions. Many of our students at Georgia Perimeter College have found this competition to be a fun and interesting experience.

Registration is FREE if your school is an institutional member and a nominal fee (for the 2013-14 school year it was \$15 for the whole school regardless of the number of students) if the school is not an institutional member. Students take the tests at their schools, eliminating the need for procuring travel money, worrying about student transport, and the like. Being a test moderator means that you would arrange for testing sessions on your campus (one in the fall and one in the spring), administer the test, and report scores to AMATYC, sending them answer sheets for verification purposes. Please consider seeing that your school participates in this competition. I have enjoyed attending the University of North Georgia Math Tournament with many of you, and getting involved in the AMATYC Student Math League requires much less time and money.
